PRESIDENTS CORNER



Greetings and happy August!
Remember, State Fair
entries will be August 26 & 27,
9AM to 5PM at the Fair Grounds.
Also, Jake at World of Wood
(AKA Albuquerque Exotic
Wood) will be collecting entries

at his shop for those who cannot make it to the fair grounds on those dates.

But now for some more comments on safety – spurred by two recent accidents suffered by NMWT members and experienced woodworkers.

The day after I submitted a letter on safety to the NMWT Newsletter – I cut off half my right thumb on my table saw: Extremely painful, very embarrassing and something that will affect the rest of my life.

Four months later, there is still a fair amount of pain, and it may take up to seven years

for the nerves to completely heal. Such basics as grasping and feeling are requiring a lot of therapy, and there is a real possibility of future surgery(s) to remove sharp bone fragments pressing against the skin. I tell you this only to illustrate the fact that recovery from this split-second accident will take years.

How did it happen? I was ripping sticks of padauk for cutting into pieces for a segmented ring I wanted to insert into a vessel. My Shopsmith was having a hard time getting through the 4/4 padauk, so I turned the speed up to max and raised the saw blade to where it peaked about 3" above the wood. The Shopsmith saw table is small, so after pushing the board through with a push stick, I was trying to keep the main board from falling off the table when the cut-off stick started vibrating back into the blade. I instinctively reached with extended index finger to push the stick out of harm's way, and pushed my thumb right into the blade. (How many errors can you count here?)

How could it have been prevented? If I had used the cumbersome upper blade shield, I'd still have two thumbs. Or I could have sought assistance to catch the boards on the far side of the saw. Or I could have used two passes to cut the stick: cut halfway through on the first pass, flip the board end-to-end, and run it through again. Any of these would have prevented my amputation.

The second incident is related by past Board President, Ron Bahm:

We get complacent even after 30 years of doing this very enjoyable hobby.

I had a segmented bowl (12" in diameter by 6 rings tall - about 5") mounted in a Cole Jaw setup made by Oneway as I cut a recess to receive a chuck. NO tail stock being used, and I was using a 1/4" bedan probably in slightly positive angle - 2 NO-NO's in my estimation. If I had had the tail stock putting a little pressure I don't think it would have come out. My face shield was on bench behind me, 3 feet away! AND Scott and I had seconds before mentioned probably a good time to use a face shield. Well in an absolute

instant the turning came out, missing my glasses but hitting my eye brow. I did not pass out but leaned forward, dripping blood very fast. That is the simple truth. The "glue up" probably weighs almost 10 pounds.

After much thinking about this I believe Cole Jaws are useful BUT not for tooling, only sanding OR for minor tooling using light pressure from tail stock OR structural tape. Also Cole Jaws have a warning not to use faster than 600 rpm. I like using a bedan but we need to remember to use it as a scraper in a negative angle.

I am going to be fine; doctor took all bandages off this afternoon. There are about 10 stitches because skull cuts release a lot of blood. I have 2 black eyes because the blood seeped to tissues around the other eye.

I will be back on lathe soon but with a lot more "safety" awareness. The bowl blank was not hurt – Titebond works!

So please folks, remember. Practice forms habits. If you routinely follow the safety guidelines of the machines and tools we use, you won't forget and someday do something you'll regret.



After much looking I have finally found a domestic source for a quality turning smock. A picture accompanies this article. The smock design and material are identical to that offered by AAW. The smocks come in five colors: Royal Blue, Navy Blue, Burgundy, Tan and Grey and in seven

sizes: S, M, L, XL, XXL, XXXL, XXXL. The smocks are sized to fit over a shirt so if you wear an L shirt you should order an L smock. AAW sells their smocks online for \$50 plus about \$9 shipping and handling plus \$3 extra for your name (added here). NMWT will charge \$50 per smock with NMWT logo plus \$3 for your name if desired. The price includes sales tax. The XXXXL size is \$3 extra and there is no price break for volume. A company in Colorado is manufacturing the smocks.
