

NMWT December 2024 Meeting

The first order of business was the selection of a Board Secretary, following Carson Harris's announcement that he will not be able to fulfill the duties of that position due to a recently discovered health condition. Current Green Wood Chair Joe "Stretch" Cole volunteered for the position, and was approved unanimously by the general membership. Thanks Stretch! The second order of business was the selection of topics for demonstrations for the coming year, 2025. Larry Linford chaired the process, beginning with a "refresher." He distributed a printed list showing the topics presented in the current year (2024) and last year (2023), as well topics suggested for 2024 but which did not receive sufficient votes to be considered. The list was copied on the whiteboard and the meeting was opened for discussion. Members suggested topics they would like to see covered next year. These were added to the lists on the whiteboard. Following about 30 minutes of suggestions, like-topics were combined for expediency, and votes were awarded by the members. NMWT December 2024 Meeting



Reflections from Last Month

NMWT December 2024 Meeting

Note that ten topics are in the offing for demonstrations because of a tie for the ninth slot (Spiral Work and Dealing with Defects/Stabilizing, with 12 votes each).

The third order of business was the annual gift exchange, in which each member brought an unwrapped item related to woodturning to put on the gift tables and received a raffle-style ticket. Items included new and used tools and accessories, apparel, raw wood, turning blanks, videos, books, etc. Many members brought in multiple items.

The stubs for the tickets were placed in a container and drawn one at a time. As each member's ticket number was called, they approached the table and selected a "gift." When the container was empty, all ticket stubs were returned to it and the process was repeated until all of the nearly 150 items were removed from the tables. A festive time was had by all.

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I joined the NM Wood Turners in September of 2022, and contacted Bill Zerby from the list of mentors in the newsletter shortly thereafter. I turned on Bill's Oneway exclusively for a short while I awaited delivery of my first lathe, a Rikon 70-150VSR. I met with Bill weekly and after several spindle projects produced my first bowl (a $5\frac{1}{2}$ " peach) in December. We produced a few more bowls, and then some plates/platters, and after only a few months, I needed to buy a bigger lathe. My Rikon 70-3040 was delivered a week or so later.

I worked with Bill weekly unless his health issues prevented us from getting together up until about six months ago when he took a turn

for the worse. I had lunch with him this week, and I'm happy to report that Bill is now doing better. He is not yet ready to get back out into the shop, but hopefully that day will come. If so, and you want a great mentor, I can highly recommend Bill's skills.

I currently turn mostly bowls, plates, and platters. What I turn is mostly dependent on what I can get out of a particular blank. I am also working on developing hollowing skills using the Trent Bosch stabilizer and laser. I am trying to figure out a DIY substitute for his Visualizer but have not yet succeeded.

Outside of turning, my professional activities include a BS and MS from Virginia Tech in geology (my actual field was mineralogy, but this specialty is not recognized in the US other than from Carnegie Melon), and a PhD from UNM (still in Geology, but now moving more in the material science area; radiation effects in ceramic, specifically). I ran a DOE-funded research program at UNM until I left UNM and the field due to local and national politics. Thus ended my first career.

I then moved into the field of computer science within the corporate arena. Most of my work centered on Active Directory and database applications and customizations for commercial software vendors. I retired from Thomson Reuters in December of 2023.

I stumbled upon woodcraft when I was back in college at the College of Wooster in Ohio. I created functional furniture out of reclaimed wood as part of my senior thesis. I looked to further my education in woodworking after I graduated, and found the Center for Furniture Craftsmanship in Rockland, Maine. In 2010, I took part in their 3-month intensive (which sadly did not include woodturning) and met a woman named Jane who was a physician assistant (PA). Because of the uncertainly of the economy around that time, I chose to pursue becoming a PA - I already had a background in emergency medicine as I had spent most of my time working as an EMT to save for woodworking school. Once I completed my PA program in 2015, I returned to the Center for Furniture Craftsmanship as a workshop assistant. It was during this time I was finally introduced to

woodturning as an assistant for John Bever's turning class during that summer. They made it look like magic! They helped me turn a few bowls and spindles which solidified that woodturning would be part of my practice (some day).

At the end of my time at the Center for Furniture Craftsmanship, I started a year-long surgical residency program for PAs in Durham, North Carolina and have subsequently worked in vascular surgery and surgical/trauma intensive (with a very brief stent in family medicine) for the last 9 years. My career (and partner) brought me out West - initially to Gallup for nearly a year, and now here to Albuquerque. I have finally found myself in a position where I have both the time and energy to refocus on leaning into learning woodcraft. A few years ago I was lucky enough to be gifted a Rockland Excelsior 5 Speed Benchtop mini lathe. I tried to teach myself how to turn Christmas trees from a blog called "Turning for Profit" by Robin G. Dalziel. While it got me to the lathe, I have yet to make something I would willfully show off. I am very grateful to be given the opportunity to be a part of this community and to learn from you all.




I came to woodworking-like experiences at a young age. My father, as a designer/Project Manager at LANL, supplemented his income as a designer for private homes. So I found myself on many Saturdays holding either or both, the idiot end of a 100' tape or a survey staff. Fast forward to High school graduation and a move for me to Washington D.C. which was the farthest away from home I could go without a passport. There I worked for the National Park Service building hiker trails, historical restoration of a masonry fort, and constructing and maintaining offices for NPS staff at the Union Station train station while it was being converted into the National Bicentennial Visitor's Center. It was the NPS connection that years later would land me in Boulder City, NV as a contracted employee of the NPS doing historical restoration on several boat ramps

and campgrounds as well as several out buildings. I then spent four years on staff at David Grant USAF Medical Center, Travis Air Force Base, Fairfield, CA, followed by 18 years in Cedar Rapids, IA and my final 10 years of practice was in Hendersonville, NC.

After retiring, my wife and I decided to live in Chapel Hill, NC (Go Tarheels!) after exhaustively looking in Austin, TX, Santa Fe, and all along the front range of Colorado. However, fate intervened, and just after signing a contract on a house in Chapel Hill, our son and daughter-in-law in Albuquerque informed us that they were expecting our first grandchild. It took us about 30 seconds to decide to move to Albuquerque. We moved in January 8th, 2019, and our granddaughter was born January 21st. Our move to NM has been our best decision to date!

Double Check the Measurements Dave Croxton

Before you start turning any type of kit that needs bushings – checking the measurements can save a lot of extra work and frustration. Don't automatically assume that bushings & kit components always have the same diameters - even if you've worked with the same item numbers together before. Your old bushings might have worn down, kit components themselves might have variations from one kit to the next, & a new bushing set might also not match up perfectly. Double check and verify that the bushing measurements actually are the correct diameter for the kit components. The last thing you want to happen is to find out in the final assembly stage, that your turned and flawlessly finished parts are either too large or too small of a diameter when fitted together. I would recommend using a digital caliper to measure the diameter(s) of each kit component and compare it to the diameter of the bushings. Now would be the time to make notations of any discrepancy and plan to make any adjustments if necessary. You might also want to double check to make sure you haven't accidently mix up your bushing sets – many of the bushings, at a quick glance, look the same. (Don't ask me how I know this...)

A Pet Urn

I found my dog! He's been misplaced for a while. I had two ideas for this piece. First idea was a standing request for a pet urn, one that possibly might hold the remains of two dogs. The other idea was to model a hydrant made by Apolo, in use in Colombia, South America. That model caught my eye a couple of years ago, as it was not something the likes of which I've seen here in the US. Whether or not one makes this piece into an urn - it is merely a container that need not have anything in it and hence not even look like a container, and it would only be an urn if used for that purpose. It has an internal capacity of 79 cu inches - I measured 5-1/2 cups of sand that filled it. At roughly one cubic inch of capacity needed per pound of body weight, this would hold what was once 79 pounds of a fireman's loving best friend. Until then, it's just a model of one of the hydrants made by Apolo. The wood is spalted, in some places more than just spalted, and curly Gambel oak from a burly growth on the tree. The wood was gathered on a fuel wood permit. The barrel and bonnet are from the same piece, parted at the base of the bonnet to allow the bonnet to be hollowed out, then glued back together. The barrel was bored out all the way down. The ports, also hollowed, are from a different Gambel oak tree. The base is Arizona walnut, which got hollowed as well to increase the internal capacity. It is 7-1/2" across the port cap pentabolts, and stand 14-3/8" tall. The pentabolt on top, which started at 3/8 x 16, has in effect a helicoil around it turning it into a 3/4 x 10 bolt to allow a funnel to be set in the hole at the top. As always, I take some liberties with the hydrant design. Some changes are the result of making something in wood that was once cast in an alloy of iron. And then some changes happen because I made a mistake. Some happen because I forgot a design detail. It is more important to me to have a comfort level with recovering from a mistake than it is to get it right the first time. If I had to do that, I would not even begin. #1337. The not shiny finish is a tung oil blend, three coats.





WIT is excitedly looking forward to what 2025 will have in store for this group! Last year we held a sphere-turning demo, a miniature tool-making demo, and a segmenting demo hosted by our own Ray Davis. We also saw some changes last year, with the liaison passing from Patricia Apt to Courtney Gale, and now from Courtney to a new, undecided liaison for this upcoming year. Stay tuned for those updates!



Membership Renewal

Membership Dues

Membership dues renewals are due on or before the last day of the month in which the member's current membership term expires. Members who do not renew within thirty (30) days after their membership expiration date will no longer have access to member privileges and will no longer receive the monthly newsletter. Annual dues are as follows:



One year: \$30 for an individual; \$35 for a family Two Years: \$55 for an individual; \$65 for a family Three Years: \$75 for an individual; \$90 for a family Lifetime: \$300 for an individual; \$350 for a family

Additional Fees

 An individual member who subsequently adds family members will pay the difference between the individual dues and the family dues rate for the remainder of that membership year (i.e., a one-year individual member adding family members would pay an additional \$5.00 dues for the remainder of the membership year).
A member requiring a mailed copy of the monthly newsletter will pay an additional \$10 per year to cover

cost of mailing.

Renew Online

We are very pleased to announce that you can now pay your membership dues with a credit card on the NMWT website at:

https://www.nmwoodturners.org/.

To access online dues payment, simply go to the new "Membership" tab near the top of the homepage and select "Pay Online" from the drop- down menu. This will take you to a secure website managed by Converge, our credit card service provider. There you will find a series of "Buy Buttons" that are clearly labeled with each membership dues option. Simply select the dues option that you want and then hit the "Checkout" button.

You will need to fill in all of the contact information on the payment processing page so that the Treasurer can confirm that our membership records are up to date and also so that he can send your new membership card by regular mail. Also, due to some reporting limitations of the Converge website, you will need to once again select the dues option you want from the drop-down menu labeled "Items Purchased". Fill in your credit card information and hit the "Submit Payment" button to complete the transaction. You should receive an "Order Confirmation" with full details of your purchase by e-mail, and the Treasurer with mail your membership card to you. That's all there is to it!
